News and Reminders:

A note regarding Arrival / Dismissal Traffic:

As the colder winter temperatures have set in, more families are choosing to drive their students to school. The result is increased traffic around our schools during morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up times. We want to take an opportunity to share some reminders to help our parking lots be as safe and efficient as possible. Please review and share the following information with anyone who may be transporting your student to school:

- Remain patient, alert, drive slowly, and observe all posted traffic signs.
- Pull as far forward as possible in the drop-off line to keep traffic moving.
- Ask your student to depart quickly; park in the lot if you must get out of the car yourself or need extra time to unload.
- Talk with older students who are dropped off across the street from school to use the marked crosswalk.
- Review and follow your school's parking lot protocols and traffic flow information, available at <u>OregonSD.org/TrafficSafety</u>.

Health Office: Head Lice FYI

Head lice season is in full swing Please read the information below carefully

- Only 1 in 10 transmissions occur at school.
- At the time live lice are found, the student has probably had the infestation for a while.
- Transmission occurs most often during playdates and sleepovers.
- Transmission can occur from shared hair care items, hats, etc. but is less likely.
- Lice do not jump and do not have wings so they cannot fly.

The American Academy of Pediatrics and the CDC **agree that school wide head lice screening programs do not have a significant effect on the incidence of head lice** and no longer recommend this practice. Doing these screenings at school also makes it impossible to protect the privacy and confidentiality of students.

Role of the school health team:

- When live lice are found, we will advise parents to follow up with their primary care provider for recommended treatment
- We will reinspect for live lice upon the students return to school
- The respective class may be notified

Parent responsibilities:

- Be familiar with how to detect head lice and how to treat it. For information read the attached 'Head Lice'
- Check your children routinely for head lice
- Inform your child's school if lice are found
- Ensure that proper treatment has been completed and no live lice are present before your child returns to school

Music

- It's time for some MARCH MUSIC MADNESS! This year's bracket will be all about music from the world of Animation.
- 3rd and 4th graders will be doing a mini-unit in March, as well as continuing some folk dance movement
- 2nd graders will be working on creating ostinato patterns and recognizing melody/harmony.

TECHNOLOGY

4-Fourth grade will be discussing how to be a Super Digital Citizen as one of our Common Sense Media lessons. The objectives are students will discuss what an upstanding digital citizen is, what cyberbullying is and ways we can be an upstanding digital citizen.

3-Third grade will begin our 3D printing unit in Tinkercad. Students will make a window pane then decorate it however they see fit.

2-Second grade will start typing lessons. We will review some good strategies to help master these typing skills.

1-First grade will be finishing up their coding unit using code.org. We are practicing some skills to get us ready for second grade.

K-Kindergarten will be using Kodable which is a coding program where they have to move objects to complete puzzles. This program builds on what we have done with the Dash robots. Using Kodable students grow confidence in their problem solving skills.

Greetings, Netherwood Knoll Families!

Here is the fourth installment of our focus on math fact fluency and ideas for how to practice outside of school! Jennifer Bay-Williams & Gina Kling who wrote Math Fact Fluency: 60+ games and Tools to Support Learning and Retention, note that Procedural fluency is the ability to compute numbers with accuracy (getting the correct answer), efficiency (reasonable time & strategy selection), and flexibility (apply and/or adapt strategy to new problems). This month's focus is on derived fact sets for multiplication and division and a sample game is provided for many. Enjoy!

This Month's Focus:	Derived Fact Sets for Multiplication/Division Math Fact Fluency		
Why?	Once foundational fact sets are automatic (See February, 2023 newsletter), learners can start to work on derived facts - facts that can be solved from foundational facts through strategy application. "The equal groups meaning of multiplication must remain at the forefront of this strategy work" (pg. 84)		
Doubling (4s, 6s, 8s)	Applied to more than just x2 facts, doubling involves halving one factor and multiplying this value by the other factor and then doubling the partial product. Ex. 4×6 could be solved as halving the factor of 4, which is 2, and multiplying each half by 6. The resulting partial products (12) are added together for a final result of 24. Written mathematically: $4 \times 6 = (2 \times 6) + (2 \times 6)$		
Adding a Group (3s, 6s)	Learners use a related fact (such as 2s or 5s facts) to then add 1 more group to. Ex. "I don't yet know what 6 x 7 is automatically, but I know 5 x 7 = 35 and if I add one more group of 7 to 35 that equals 42." Half Tens + One Set		
Subtracting a Group (9s, 4s)	Especially useful for learning the 9s facts, but also supports the learning of 4s and 8s and others; this strategy suggests anchoring to a larger fact series, such as the $\times 10$ facts and removing one group. Ex. 9 x 7 - "If I know 10 x 7 = 70, then 9 groups of 7 would be 70 - 7, which is 63." Tens Minus One Set		
Near Squares	A special strategy related to Add or Subtract a Group strategies, in which drawing a quick array sketch can help to determine if adding or subtracting a group is necessary - Near Squares, such as 7×8 or 8×7 can be solved by either: starting with 7×7 (Square Number) and adding another group of 7 [OR] starting with 8×8 (Square Number) and subtracting a group of 8 .		
Break Apart (3s, 4s, 6s, 7s, 8s, 9s)	Decomposing (breaking apart) a factor in a way that makes sense to the learner so as to be more flexible and efficient at solving an unknown fact. Thinking about which factor and how to break it apart takes time and practice. All of the previous mentioned strategies are also versions of the Break Apart method. Rectangle Fit Multiplication Salute


